A review of <u>Amazing Grace</u>, <u>William Wilberforce</u> and the <u>Heroic Campaign to End Slavery</u>, Eric Metaxas, HC 2007

The book choice for Valentine's day was apt. It was about Love, Love with a capital L, the Love upon which Christians believe all other forms of Love are based.

Amazing Grace is the true account of the life of British Antislaver William Wilberforce (1759-1833) who spent his entire political career as a Member of the British Parliament focused on two things. First he aimed to rid Britain of their active participation in the slave trade where shiploads of west coast Africans were stolen and shipped across the Atlantic to become enslaved at the other end of their journey. Wilberforce's second goal was to abolish slavery itself in Britain altogether. It was only upon his death bed that his end goal was reached. His fortitude and determination speak to his all encompassing commitment to Christ. He never let go of his vision. There are other notables also mentioned in the book who became known as the Anti-slavers, and John Newton was one of them. He wrote the words to the hymn Amazing Grace. He had been captain of a slave ship himself. His own story is a long, complicated one but it is alleged that a terrible storm at sea was one of several moments that eventually brought him to Christianity. The next time we sing "I once was blind but now I see" we will know that he was referring to those salient moments over time when God woke

The work of the Anti-slavery movement continues today, working with slavery issues that continue in various forms around the world, even in 2023. Their work runs out of a small office space in Brixton, London, England. On the walls are pictures of William Wilberforce, Thomas Clarkson, John Newton, and others who dedicated their lives both of the Gospel message and to the rescuing those who deserve mercy.

Do you need something to give focus to your efforts this upcoming Lent? Then consider what the Reformed Episcopal Church is offering. Under its Matthew 25 initiative, the theme for Lent 2023 is on giving of ourselves and our resources to our neighbours. Over the 40 days of Lent we will learn in practical ways what it looks like to extend mercy to our neighbours, especially those living in poverty. Taking our example from the Good Samaritan who first saw the vulnerable man, then stopped his own journey, and then showed him mercy, we will learn how to see, stop, and show. To learn each day you will receive a reflection on Christ's heart for those living in poverty, at-risk families,, refugees and immigrants. The weekly rhythm of reflections is as follows:

Monday: Unpack topic: why Anglican Christians care/should care about this topic, starting from Scripture and Biblical theology.

Tuesday: Statistics to paint the scope of the issue **Wednesday**: A story from the life of an Anglican champion

Thursday: Ministry highlight, encouraging engagement with an established ministry doing work in that area **Friday**: Content from ARDF (Anglican Relief and Development Fund), offering a global perspective on the week's theme

Saturday: A focused prayer for those suffering and/or ministering under that theme

Sunday: No reflection. Day of rest for you to reflect on what has been received in the past week..
