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### **HOANING IN ON HYMNS**

If you have attended St George's anytime in the last 40 years you will be familiar with the hymn "God Be In My Head" – it has concluded every service in the 20+ years I have attended. It was sung by four of us as Hilda Drummond closed her eyes for the last time in 2014, and she knew it, squeezing my hand with her last Amen.

The Sarum Prayer was introduced as early as the 15<sup>th</sup> century in monasteries, being included in the 1514 Book of Hours, and published in the 1558 Sarum (Salisbury) Primer. The author is unknown. Credit is given to Lytlington for the tune, and to Sir Henry Walford Davies and others for the choral settings in the early 1900s. It was first printed on a leaflet in 1910 used in the Festival Service Book (1912) of the London Church Choir Association of St Paul's Cathedral. Wouldn't it be fascinating to know how many times and how many people have sung this beautiful prayer through the centuries.

God be in my head, and in my thinking.
God be in my eyes, and in my looking.
God be in my mouth, and in my speaking.
Oh, God be in my heart, and in my understanding.
God be at mine end and at my departing.
