During Lent 2023 I started reading a newsletter that the Matthew 25 initiative of the Anglican Church of North America publishes. It is ongoing so I get it daily. It has impacted me deeply. I have written the above quote down this week in order to keep it. It is appropriate and potent, considering that as a congregation you have given Vestry the

go-ahead to sponsor a young man from Afghanistan to relocate to Hamilton to be near his sister and his tiny niece, both of whom are known to those of us who attended the Friendship Circle. This decision puts us near that white hot centre of the Gospel.

As time goes on and as we do the necessary paperwork, we will share with you his name and further details so you can picture him more closely. Once The United Nations High Commission for Refugees has his name on a list for Canada he will be in a safer position than he is at the moment. But that is a while off and the process could take from 2-4 years.

The Matthew 25 initiative has made me go back and back again to that wonderful Chapter in Matthew's Gospel. It is a direct command.

My King James Version says it this way in verses 35-40.."For I was an hungred, and ye gave me meat: I was thirsty, and ye gave me drink: I was a stranger and you took me in. Naked and ye clothed me: I was in prison and ye came unto me."

When Jesus' followers asked him when was He ever hungry, or thirsty or in jail Jesus answered "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me." (Verse 40.)

This past Thursday evening, Amal, the Syrian journalist for whom you have prayed every Sunday for a year, arrived at Pearson airport. It was a joyous occasion indeed. She has been delivered from living under threat and in great fear for her life. She said over and over to the group who was there to greet her, "You have saved my life." This is the power that we in North America hold. It is possible for a small community group to join together and sponsor a person towards a new future, a future of the kind of freedom that we take for granted. We all have a story, not only newcomers. This most recent sponsorship venture has reminded me that as people of all backgrounds we can bind our own stories together in one big human story and with God's guidance can make wonderful things happen for somebody else.

When Jesus said "Love your neighbour as yourself" He was talking about the entire world. If you had seen the crowd getting off the incoming flights at Pearson on Thursday evening you would know that there is a new Canada on the way. We have been directed to be the salt of the world. We are meant to use that message to add flavour to the brokenness of a world that necessitates people fleeing their homeland in fear of their lives.

I have recently read a book called The Road To Dawn: Josiah Henson and the Story that Sparked the Civil War by Jared Brock. It was about the runaway slave Josiah Henson. Desperate to get away from his owners he fled with his wife and four children in tow. He got as far as the Ohio River, the slave hunters in pursuit. When he looked across the river he knew that on the other side lay freedom. He noticed a small boat at the bottom of the hill. If he asked the boat captain to

help them get across the river the chances were twofold: the Captain might report him to the slave hunters or he might agree to take them across. Henson approached him. The Captain said "Get in." Those two words changed many lives. Henson became a Baptist Minister and built the house in Dresden, Ontario which became a home for escaped slaves. Refugee sponsorship is a remarkable experience, a satisfaction that grows from knowing that we are not just talking about the world news but are doing something to ameliorate it. And it is a great deal more wonderful at the airport arrivals gate when you can share one of those huge, embracing 'Welcome to Canada'hugs.

He knows how to run, how to pull out plugs, how to work the converter, in which drawer to find his socks so he can show them to us, how to eat yogurt by sticking his tongue into the container to finish it off, and all that at 18 months. We had several demonstrations of fights between the plastic Spiderman and the plastic Ironman and the fighting ended when the plastic dinosaur entered into the fray. Such a noise you've never experienced unless you've had little boys of your own.

We thanked God for each other and for our food before lunch.

We all had fun learning Dari words this past spring so I'm sending some new ones out into the atmosphere.

Here goes. We ate delicious things, among them Qabili Palau (rice with raisins and lamb), bamya (okra) and salat (lettuce and cucumbers with dressing).

## HERE I AM LORD, Is It I

### Dan Schutte 1947 -

Another favourite, but a contemporary hymn ... written in 1981 and became popular immediately,... being voted the 5<sup>th</sup> Most Favourite Hymn in Songs of Praise. Dan Schutte a Jesuit studying in Berkeley was asked by a friend to write a hymn for an upcoming diaconate ordination – the ordination was to be in two days ! He was instructed to include in his hymn imagery of the word of God, the light of Christ, and bread and wine. His response was 'gosh, I don't know that I can do this'. He was suffering from the flu, and sat with his guitar in hand, knowing not what to write nor even

where to begin. He prayed to God . God if I am to do this for my friend, you have to help me. He asked for the opinion of a group of St Louis Jesuits, who suggested he change the chorus, Here I am Lord, here I stand, to Here I am Lord, it is I. He completed the hymn in two days, and presented it to his friend, editing along the way; it has become a loved hymn over the last thirty years, and he says 'I had no idea it would be so popular, I was so nervous ' He says he 'hardly remembers the ordination, but remembers everyone praising his hymn and said 'If only they knew how the last two day had been for me trying to make this work'. The inspiration was Isaiah 6:8 and 1 Samuel 3, Answering God's call.
