### HONING IN ON HYMNS

### <u>Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing</u> Robert Robinson (1735-1790)

Robert had a rough beginning, his father died when he was young and his mother, unable to control him, sent him to London to learn barbering. What he learned instead was drinking and gang life. When he was 17 he and friends visited a fortune teller. They laughed as she tried to tell their fortunes. But something about the encounter bothered Robert and decided to attend an evangelist meeting , held by George Whitefield., that evening. George Whitefield was one of history's greatest preachers and that night preached from Matthew 3:7 Robert sensed Whitefield was preaching directly to him, and the words haunted him for three years when he gave his heart to Christ. Robert entered the ministry and later in 1758 wrote a hymn for his sermon. Come Thou Fount of Every blessing has been a favourite since that day. In 1790 at age 54 he passed away quietly during the night.

Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing Tune my heart to sing Thy grace Streams of mercy, never ceasing, Call for songs of loudest praise Teach me some melodious sonnet, sung by flaming tongues above, Praise the mount I'm fixed upon it, Mount of God's unchanging love.

Here I raise my Ebenezer; Hither by Thy help I come And I hope by Thy good pleasure, Safely to arrive at home Jesus sought me when a stranger Wandring from the fold of God He, to rescue me from danger, Interposed His precious blood

Oh, to grace how great a debtor

From Then Sing My Soul



Daily I'm constrained to be Let thy grace, Lord, like a fetter Bind my wand'ring heart to thee Prone to wander, Lord, I feel it, Prone to leave the God I love Here's my hear, Lord take and seal it. Seal it for thy courts above.
