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HONING IN ON HYMNS BE THOU MY VISION Dallan Forgaill (560-640 AD)

A favourite of many from St George's, sung so beautifully by the members It is one of the oldest hymns still sung regularly today, and unless you are a scholar in medevial gaelic, a little bit of a mystery. There seems to be no heart wrenching story to be told, just a beautiful poem by a pious medieval poet who was sainted in the 11th century.

It is said he founded numerous churches in Ireland, likely because of friendship with clergy, and to ensure a place for wanting souls to have masses..

Be Thou My Vision' is based on a 6th-century poem titled Rop tum o Baile' by Irish poet Eochaid Forgaill, (536 AD) **Eochaid** later earned the nickname 'Dallán', which translates to 'little blind one', after he lost his sight. It is said that after completing the poem his sight was restored.

Centuries later, In 1905, Forgaill's Gaelic words were translated into English by Irish linguist and journalist, Mary Byrne. Several years later Eleanor Hull, a scholar in Old Irish, adapted Byrne's English translation into verse, giving us the lyrics most commonly sung today and crafted into rhyme using the Irish folk tune 'Slane'..

As expected, all things being Irish, St Patrick figures well into the history, Slane is the area where Patrick reportedly challenged local druids with the gospel.

It is said to be a favourite of King Charles III and a newly set version of the hymn was performed at his coronation at Westminster Abbey last year.


