And thanks to Sandra who is always there with her soft voice and to Esther who finds it much easier to get down on the floor to assemble the wooden train tracks than I do.



THE SEASON OF ADVENT

Advent is a four-week period in the Christian calendar that prepares for the celebration of Christmas: Beginning the closest to November 30 in Western churches, and on the sixth Sunday before Christmas in the Ambrosian and Mozarabic Rites of the Catholic Church.

The four candles of the Advent wreath specifically symbolize the Christian concepts of hope, peace, joy and love, with these candles being lit subsequently throughout each week of the Advent season.

Gaudete Sunday is the third Sunday of Advent and marks a shift in the tone of Advent from reflection to joyful anticipation. The word "Gaudete" is a Latin verb that means "rejoice". The pink (rose) candle is lit on the third Sunday.

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The purple Prophecy or Hope Candle symbolizes hope and the anticipation of Christ's coming.

Second candle

The purple Bethlehem Candle symbolizes peace and preparation, and commemorates Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem.

Third candle

The rose-colored Shepherd's Candle symbolizes joy, and marks the midpoint of Advent on the third Sunday of Advent.

Fourth candle

The purple Angel's Candle symbolizes peace, and marks the final week of Advent.

The candles are lit and extinguished in a particular order so that the Gospel side candle is never burning alone. The Gospel side of the church is the left side as you are facing the front. So the candles are lit from right to left and extinguished from left to right.

Many Advent wreaths also have a white candle in the center, known as the Christ candle, which symbolizes the birth of Jesus. The Christ candle is typically lit on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day, and may be lit throughout the rest of the Christmas season.

The Advent wreath itself is circular, representing God's infinite love, and is usually made of evergreen leaves, which represent the hope of eternal life brought by Jesus Christ.

Advent is a season of waiting, but it's not meant to be empty waiting. Be intentional about the time spent before celebrating Jesus' birth! Prepare your heart and mind to receive Christ at Christmas by establishing some helpful Advent prayer practice.
