I've been reading Canadian artist Emily Carr's letters to her great friend, CBC Radio's Ira Dilworth.





Emily must have been a wonderful sort. I wish I'd known her. She had a rebellious nature but in a worthwhile sort of a way. She knew when something wasn't quite cricket.

I sense that in her flip-side there lived a lonely and loving soul who needed some soothing reassurance as to her worth in the male-dominated world of her swirling, glorious art.

Emily was a devoutly spiritual Christian who sang the hymn "Breathe

on Me Breath of God" before she began each new painting of the beauties of the B.C. forests and the swirling skies of which she was so fond. Her family helped to build The Church of Our Lord in Victoria, B.C., a tribute to the Carpenter Gothic style. For many years it was a Reformed Episcopal Church and later became a part of ACNA.

In her letter to Ira on Sunday evening, Jan. 18, 1942, Emily told Him how much she enjoyed his Sunday evening CBC radio program, 'Sanctuary.' It was a program of poetry and quiet music. She told him that what she loved about it was its "Sunday-ness."

"Sanctuary is such real Sunday-ness. I am sure it settles many peacefully into quiet nights as it does me", she told him. "The beautiful places! Oh the loveliness that we forget and neglect!", she continued.

It has made me think about my own Sunday-ness and how the pattern of my childhood Sundays followed me into rearing our own children with Sunday School and roast beef and Yorkshire puddings with visiting grandparents at dinner.

Sunday did have a pattern of its own. The Sunday feeling was a complete stepping away from everydayness. The television never went on in the Sundays of my childhood. It was a day for church followed by afternoons at home playing Snap! or reading a Nancy Drew mystery or playing quiet games.

We went to evening church as well where my Uncle would play his violin and the music soared Heavenward up into the rafters of that little wooden

sanctuary that my grandfather and dad and uncles had helped to build with their hands-on labour. I'm thankful for Emily's concept of Sunday-ness. I am refreshed with the cadence and the loveliness of the words in the Prayer Book and with the power of our hymns as the music enfolds us. Together the words and music recharge me and point me forward to the week ahead.

The Church of Our Lord in Victoria, BC is a beautiful Carpenter Gothic style church built to be a Reformed Episcopal Church, taking four years to build and completed in 1870 at a cost of \$9,700. It is designated as a National Heritage site. It is said that on October 29, 1874 Bishop Cridge walked down the hill with the congregation that wanted to break away from the Anglican church. Emily Carr was part of that group. When the REC Diocese of Western Canada was closed about 8 years ago, the members of the Church of Our Lord elected to join ANiC. The church is active and celebrating its 150th year in 2025 and a great supporter of the work of the REC-ANiC in Cuba.

Peter Raymond Scholtes was a priest, consultant, and author. In the 1960s, as a parish priest and choral conductor in a South Chicago church he wrote the hymn "They'll Know We Are Christians by Our Love" for an ecumenical event for his youth group.

By the 1980s, Peter Scholtes had left the priesthood and become a business management consultant and author. He co-authored The Team Handbook, which was named one of The 100 Best Business Books of All Time. His best-known book is The Leader's Handbook, from 1998. In 2006 he was a recipient of the Deming Award.
