HONING IN ON HYMNS

King of Love, O Christ We Crown You Charles V Pilcher 1935

King of Love, o Christ, we crown you Lord of thought and lord of will Each demand of thy high challenge Dedicated to fulfill

We with thee by grace coworkers Till, wher'er man's food hath trod Peoples, Kings, dominions, races Own the empire of our God

King of Life, who has created Wheat in golden harvest spread Make thy servants strong to serve thee By the gift of daily bread.

Feed us with thy Body broken
With thy blood outpoured sustain
That our souls divinely strengthened
May the life eternal gain

King of Mercy, thou has saved us From the haunting sense of loss Nailing in thy vast compassion Sin's indictment to the Cross

Them who loved, by thy sore anguish From the past thou makest free Breathing words of absolution Where thou reignest from the Tree

King triumphant, King victorious Take thy throne our hearts within I was curious about this hymn when singing it last Sunday – a beautiful hymn I hadn' heard before. What was initially of interest to me was that it was written in 1935. How many other hymns are in The Book of Common Praise from 'our' lifetime? Turns out Bishop Charles Pilcher was in Toronto when he wrote this hymn, a scholar at Wycliffe College until 1936 here's more taken from relevant sources. Alison

Born in Oxford, England and died and buried in Australia, Charles Venn Pilcher (4 June 1879 - 4 July 1961) was an Anglican bishop, theologian and writer and translator of hymns. He held curacies in Birmingham UK 1903-05 and St James Toronto 1910-1916 and taught theology at Wycliffe College, Toronto from 1916-1936, until he was elected a co-adjutor Bishop of Sydney Australia; he was secretary of the Australian Hymn Supplement Committee, and author of the Preface to the Australian Hymn Supplement to the Book of Common Praise. He wrote hymns and composed tunes for both the original hymn book (produced in Canada) He composed hymn tunes and other music, and long played bass clarinet in the Toronto Symphony Orchestra. He also translated and published devotional material from Iceland (Iceland Christian Classics (1950) These side interests, like his hymn writing, served to heighten and deepen his influence as a teacher.

The plaque at his burial place reads:

TO THE GLORY OF GOD AND





IN HONOURED MEMORY OF CHARLES VENN PILCHER 1879-1941

FOR TWENTY YEARS BISHOP CO-ADJUTOR IN THIS DIOCESE
HE ALSO SERVED THE CHURCH IN ENGLAND AND CANADA.
A SCHOLAR AND AUTHOR OF DISTINCTION, A MASTER OF
CHURCH MUSIC, AN INTERPRETER OF ICELANDIC POETRY, A
LOVER OF ISRAEL AND A FRIEND OF THE REFUGEE.
