THE WINDOWS.....

All who have ventured through our red doors have likely heard the story of our windows, I love to show visitors the sanctuary – switching on the light boxes of the stained glass windows depicting The Road to Emmaus, and the incredible story of their journey from St George's Hamilton to a funeral home in Buffalo, NY and then back to Hamilton.

There are others windows at the church, and these are topics of discussion too..... Many of us who arrived at 134 Emerson to join the members of St Margaret's Church in 2004 met Pauline Smith, whose late husband Clarence was the creator of many of them . The stained glass window 10 ft high as you exit the sanctuary is entitled Christ the King is described as follows by Clarence, found on a yellowed sheet of paper in the files...

Christ the King

A great many of the important events in our Biblical History have had a bearing on the design and creation of this stained glass window that is being dedicated today. It tells us that The three hours of darkness from mid day till three o'clock has passed. The lightning has stopped and the earthquake is over. The Crucifixion Crosses stand bare and rejected., The tomb is open and empty. It is beyond the third day, Christ has risen to sit on the right hand of God the Father and now fills His position in the Trinity of Father, Son and Holy Spirit, represented by partial green circles around the Crown. The Crown and Cross are symbols of Christ the King. All has passed as was prophesized and written. Christ is the King of Kings, a living and perpetual promise that true repentance brings God's forgiveness of our sins. We have the Cross, a symbol of God's undying love for mankind.

All the liturgical colours of the church – white, green red, blue, gold, black and purple have been used to create this stained glass window which I have named: Christ the King. Clarence Smith

None of us knew Clarence except perhaps Bev, ... how I wish we did. If only he knew we are lauding him all these years after his masterpiece.

We are so privileged to be able to enjoy the history of this building because of the diligent record keepers over the years. The McMaster Library holds the archives of St Margaret's Church, and there is much to read through their 90 year history.





We are the history makers now – let us remember to keep thorough records of all our treasures.

In the meantime, let us get to know you? Eugene M Bartlett 1885-1941

Eugene M. Bartlett Sr. Born in 1885 in Missouri, a singer, music publisher, producer and a songwriter. Mr. Bartlett began his career as a publisher for the

Central Music Company in Arkansas and later formed the Hartford Music Company in 1918 with a few friends. There he would publish his hymnals, periodicals, and magazines.

Life could not have been better for Eugene. He married his sweetheart in 1917 and they raised 2 children. As a publisher his hymn book was in demand, selling over 15,000 copies across the county. He felt his calling was to publish hymns and teach aspiring singers how to sight-read so he traveled the south, holding singing school and singing conventions.

But in 1939 at age 53, his world changed drastically. Mr. Bartlett suffered a paralyzing stroke that left him unable to walk or even speak and for the most part, he was bedridden. Many felt the stroke ended his teaching ministry, yet It was during these dark days that Eugene wrote Victory In Jesus. While looking back over his life he began to think back to the night he was born again and the rich life he had since that night. He picked up a pen and began what would become his best-known song. When he completed the song, he looked back over it and seen it was a story of redeeming power from start to finish. He wanted the song to be joyous. And while written during the darkest period of his life he chose to make the melody full of happiness and enthusiasm.

Since he was no longer able to travel to minister or teach his son, Eugene Jr took over. He would travel around the south continuing his father's ministry. One night, as the story goes, he had traveled to East Texas for a revival service. He had asked a well-known evangelist of the time to speak. The man did and gave a wonderful sermon but when the invitation was given no one came forward. Eugene, Jr. said he felt the Lord urging him to sing his Father's new song which he had not sung publicly before. He did and as he sang many in attendance began to come forward to give their life to the Lord Jesus. At the end of the service over 50 men and women had accepted Christ as their savior.

During his time of suffering there were days where he felt depressed, alone and sad, yet he still found the inspiration to declare, "I cried, Dear Jesus, come and heal my broken spirit and somehow Jesus came and brought to me the victory". Iin the midst of all that was wrong in his life he found the





courage to proclaim Jesus and the Victory he had in knowing Jesus was the answer and source of his joy. Eugene Bartlett Sr passed away in 1941 from complications of his stroke. He was buried at Oak Hill Cemetery in Siloam Springs, Arkansas. In 1973 Eugene Bartlett was inducted into the Gospel Music Hall in Nashville Tennessee.

REFORMED EPISCOPAL CHURCH HISTORY – NOT SO LONG AGO – WE ARE PART OF THIS!

 \dots a letter from our Presiding Bishop introducing this historical change \dots

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ

The new province called for by GAFCON (Global Anglican Futures Conference) is now a reality. On Dec 3, 2008 in suburban Chicago, The Province of the Anglican Church in North America was inaugurated. The GAFCON Primates Council. meeting in London on Dec 6, 2008 welcomed the establishment of the province with their blessing. The REC, as a member of the Common Cause Partnership, stands as a founding member of this new province. This historic event marks the dawning of a new day for faithful Anglicans in North America and around the world. A new reformation of the church is underway, and God has granted us the privilege of participating in it from its earliest stages of planning and development. It is of significance to note that within the relationships of this new province the integrity of each member jurisdiction is retained and protected. In particular, the following provisions in the Constitution & Canons may be of interest. Article VIII of the Constitution of the Province stipulates that 'the member jurisdictions shall each maintain all authority they do not yield to the Province by their own consent'. The same Article goes on to specify that "The province shall make no canon abridging the authority of any member dioceses ...with respect to its practice regarding the ordination of women. Canon 6 provides that "all books of Common Prayer and liturgies previously authorized by the originating jurisdictions shall be permitted in use for this Church.

It is to be expected that people will soon begin to seek out parishes based on affiliation with the new Province. In order to benefit from this new relationship, our parishes should begin the represent themselves before the public as being affiliated with the Anglican Church in North America.

The Province remains in a formative stage of development with much work still lying ahead. Reformed Episcopalians are actively involved at virtually every level of that process, giving us a vital stake in the life of this new and promising effort. It is my hope that this report on the inauguration of the Province of the Anglican Church in North America, and of our place in this new fellowship, will bring a renewed sense of hopeful





encouragement, joyful expectation, and deep gratitude to the heart of every Reformed Episcopalian, as w undertake together this new phase of our witness and mission in church. Faithfully yours, in Christ

Attendance in the <u>Anglican Church in North America</u> (ACNA) is up by double digits for the third consecutive year, according to congregational report data released June 19 during the denomination's Provincial Council meeting at Trinity Anglican Seminary in Ambridge, Pennsylvania. "We've grown in every category that we track," said Dan Hassler, director of administration and operations. "We are at highest attendance and membership of all time."The denomination in 2024 reported a net increase of 14 congregations to a total of 1,027, an increase in membership of 1,997 (+1.5 percent) to a total of 130,111 and an increase in attendance of 11,354 (+13.4 percent) to a total of 96,148.
