#### William Doane, 1832-1915

Born in Connecticut he grew up in a devout family, and turned to Christ as a young teenager. At age 18 was hired by one of America's largest woodworking machinery factories. By the age of 30 he was President of the company. At that time he had a heart attack and nearly died; he felt his illness had not been caused by long hours or hard work He felt God was chastening him for not devoting more time to the gospel. He began writing music and eventually published volumes of Sunday school songs, but was frustrated because he didn't produce quality poems; he needed a godly lyricist. He was asked to write the music for an important mission's university, he needed the words... He knelt in his room and laid out his request before the Lord. There was a knock at the door and the messenger brought a note from Fanny Crosby saying "Mr Doane I have never met you but I feel compelled to send you this hymn. May God bless it." Thus begun a wonderful partnership. He wrote about 2.000 times. He died on Christmas Day 1915. His vast estate went to his two daughters who used it to fund Christian missionary and educational causes in the 20century.
